

# First Annual St. Dismas Award




During the conference Mass, the first annual *St. Dismas Award* for excellence in Catholic prison ministry was given posthumously by Dismas Ministry's board of directors to *Rev. Christian Reuter*, *OFM*, for his many years of service to the incarcerated. He is remembered for his joyful, unselfish, and tireless ministry on behalf of the imprisoned and the marginalized.

Fr. Chris had been scheduled to present at the Bridges of Hope national Catholic prison ministry conference featured in this newsletter, but died this summer on June 30, following complications from back surgery. He was 79.

He was a long-time promoter of pastoral care for prisoners, an advocate of prison reform, and his joyful, unselfish, and tireless ministry on behalf of the imprisoned and the marginalized was a true example of the Francisican spirit.

Father Reuter and a number of lay and ordained prison ministers created *Our Brothers Keepers* of Southern Illinois, a re-entry project to assist returning citizens when they leave prisons. By the time of his passing, the group had established a job-training program and is looking for a place for people to stay just after being released as a re-entry house.



# **The New Catholic Prison Ministries Coalition**

In 2018, a new entity has been formed to enhance Catholic ministry to those incarcerated, detained, reentering society, as well as those affected by incarceration.

The Catholic Prison Ministries Coalition (CPMC) will serve as a hub network, a resource, and an advocate for ministers and chaplains who need on-going support to do their ministry.

As Catholics, there is also a need to be advocating legislatively, both locally and nationally, for the needs of those in prison, out of prison, doing the ministry, and the detained.

"The Coalition will include national Catholic organizations which presently provide resources to families and all those affected by incarceration/detention, such as Catholic Charities USA, St. Vincent de Paul Society, Knights of Malta, Jesuit Conference, and hopefully others," said Karen Clifton, member of the executive committee,

and founder and former executive director of Catholic Mobilizing Network.

CATHOLIC PRISON MINISTRIES COALITION
